




BUSAN and SEOUL, Korea

The Sisters of Mary operates and maintains charity programs for education, medical care, child and adult welfare in Korea. Expenditures for these programs include operating expenses, administrative expenses and other expenses.

In Busan, complete renovation of the kitchen floors in the dormitories was completed this year. A house was purchased and renovated into a bakery that provides bread to homeless people. Waterproofing was done at the hospital roof. A 12-seater passenger van was purchased. Computers were purchased too. This year, the Busan Technical High-school was closed on February 28, 2018.

The construction of the Aloysius Family Center in Seoul was completed and inaugurated on December 8, 2018. The Center will provide free dental treatments and out-patient medical consultations to the poor and the children from the Boystown and Girlstown.

CAVITE and CEBU, Philippines

The charity programs in the Philippines continue to provide temporary shelter and junior and senior high school with specialization in different vocation trainings to boys and girls from the poorest of the poor families aged between 12-18 years old. Out-patient medical care for the poor and the students is provided by the infirmaries. The Sisters of Mary with the Brothers of Christ provide residential care and permanent shelter in Amadeo, Cavite to homeless mentally-challenged men. Male out-of-school youth undergo classes in General Trias to prepare them for an acceleration examination to be eligible for a high-school diploma. Technical courses are integrated in these classes to further qualify the graduates for jobs. Expenditures include operating expenses, administrative expenses and other expenses.


This year 100 kilowatt peak (kwp) solar panels were installed at the Biga campus. The solar panels will provide almost 10% savings on electric billings. Spare parts of laundry and kitchen equipment, computers, science laboratory tools, musical instruments and a dental chair were purchased. Shower rooms and toilets were renovated in Doty Building. The influent pumps of the sewage treatment plant were replaced. Two rooms were renovated at the infirmary as caregiving workshops of the students. Wooden jalousies were replaced with extruded aluminum jalousies. Also completed this year were installation of 2 high volume low speed fans at the gym, installation of kitchen hood fire suppression system, rehabilitation of fire-fighting equipment and accessories, steel grilles for the side stairs and the rehabilitation of the deep wells.

A new light duty truck with passenger van was purchased for Adlas campus. Repainting of the external surfaces of the buildings was started this year. Several projects were also completed this year. A fire detection and alarm communication system was installed. Additional water tanks were installed on the buildings. A new upgraded library was completed along with updated books and magazines. Musical instruments, ovens, CAD plotter, wireless portable speakers systems, laptops and computers were purchased.

Repairs and renovations of the kitchen, workshops, toilets and bathrooms and the science laboratory were completed this year in Talisay. Computers, laptops, music instruments, television sets, ovens, inverters, sewing machines and a passenger van were purchased.

In Minglanilla, repairs of the ceiling eaves and the roofs of the workshops were completed this year. The exterior of 2 buildings, a workshop and the outdoor and indoor basketball courts were repainted. Laptops, musical instruments and 2 washing machines were purchased.



The Boystown in Guadalajara and Girlstown in Chalco continue to provide temporary shelter, technical, middle-school and high school education to children from the poorest of the poor families whose ages range from 12-18 years of age. Toddlers from poor families are looked after at the day care center. Older children in the day care center attend kindergarten classes. Expenditures include operating expenses, administrative expenses and other expenses.

The renovation of an existing house into a museum for the memorabilia of Ven. Schwartz and construction of a spiritual center for students and graduates were completed this year and inaugurated on June 24, 2018. Upkeep of several facilities in Chalco were done this year. The gymnasiums were re-varnished. The industrial workshop was repainted. Structural reinforcements were made on one building that was damaged during an earthquake. Toilet doors were replaced. Two washing machines were purchased.

Constructions of an outdoor gym and welding workshop were completed this year in Guadalajara. A science and chemical laboratory was completed as well. The track and field was rehabilitated along with the drinking fountains surrounding it.







General maintenance of the showers, clinic and boilers were completed at Zona 13 this year. School desks, security cameras and computers were purchased.





DECREE

The religious Institute of the **Sisters of Mary** whose principal seat is established in the Archdiocese of Manila, was founded by the Reverend Mgr. Aloysius Schwarts, and erected as of diocesan right on March 2, 1993.

The Sisters engage themselves in educational/vocational welfare of underprivileged children/youth, medical care to the sick and the dying, shelter service to homeless and helpless people.

Supported by the testimonial letters of the other diocesan Bishops concerned, His Eminence Cardinal Jaime L. Sin, Archbishop of Manila, has asked the Apostolic See to have the religious Institute of the Sisters of Mary recognized as of pontifical right.

The Most Holy Father Pope John Paul II, having heard the favourable opinion of the Congregation for Institutes of Consecrated Life and for Societies of Apostolic Life, has graciously granted the above mentioned request.

By means of this present Decree, therefore, this Congregation declares that, from now onwards, the Institute of the Sisters of Mary is a religious Institute of pontifical right.

The same Congregation moreover approves and confirms the Constitutions which correspond to the English text kept in its archives.

May the Sisters Mary live faithfully their religious consecration and dedicate themselves generously to the apostolate of the Institute, according to their charism.

All things to the contrary notwithstanding.
